***Descriptions for PUAD “Topics” Courses**

PUAD 694: Topics in Public Admin: Law, Courts & Public Policy

Instructor: Misty Grayer (GTA)

This course focuses on the role of law and legal institutions in the American public policymaking process. A number of topics will be examined with particular emphasis on the theoretical foundations and historical developments of court-made law. Students will investigate the role of judges as policymakers and political actors and whether citizens can generate reform and social change through litigation and access to the courts. The course will also survey research in several key policy areas including policing, civil rights, and employment opportunities.

PUAD 694: Topics in Public Admin: Labor Relations in the Public Sector

Instructor: Craig Christiansen (Lecturer)

Nearly half of all public administrators now work with the daily impact of a union contract, but labor relations is much more than contract negotiations. This course is guided by a fundamental question, “As public administrators, how can we use labor relations skills to build public and nonprofit organizations that function cooperatively and effectively to enhance the overall public value of the agency’s services?” Designed to add practical skills and understanding of labor relations to the administrative repertoire of the student, intern, or practitioner, this course reviews key concerns, concepts, and tools in the administration of a unionized workplace. Student learning is facilitated through short lectures, class discussion with practitioners, assigned readings, review and discussion of case study materials, student-led presentations of assigned articles/chapters, and applied class and student projects. The online modality allows the student maximum flexibility in scheduling and class access.

PUAD 694: Topics in Public Admin: Sustainable Communities

Instructor: Bradley Lane (Assistant Professor)

This course investigates the role of transportation in urban society. The course examines the processes of planning, policy-making and implementation, and professional practice in transportation through a sustainability lens by treating sustainability as an integral part of transportation. Content areas include modes of transport, investment and policies in transportation, spatial relations in transportation, interactions between transportation and land use, and how sustainability concepts interact with policy, market forces, and personal behavior in transportation. Students will develop a holistic understanding of how transportation – and their own personal travel behaviors – influences and is influenced by our physical, social, economic, and institutional environments. The course will help prepare students for future focused study and careers in transportation, planning, sustainability, and other related topics. The course will also enhance student skills in professional communication, critical thinking, research, and analysis.

PUAD 694: Topics in Public Admin: Douglas County Child Abuse Prevention Task Force

Instructor: Andi Witczak (Lecturer)

Students in this course will spend the semester as consultants and facilitators to the Douglas County Child Abuse Prevention Task Force. The Task Force is a consortium of 20+ Douglas County nonprofits, government agencies, and community partners, seeking to improve child abuse prevention efforts and reexamine child in crisis policies/procedures. We will pursue these challenges through the human-centered and context-centered methods of design thinking. Design thinking is a generative process unparalleled at creating both disruptive and incremental innovation to address the complex issues of our day. This is **not** a lecture course, it is a **thinking and doing** course. Students will gain experience learning and applying design thinking frameworks, working within an interdisciplinary team, applying adaptive leadership principles in a civic context, and addressing challenges and opportunities related to child abuse realities in Douglas County.

CLASS SCHEDULE

PUAD 939: Topics in Public Admin: Policy Governance, Neoliberalism, and the Carceral State

Instructor: Steven Maynard-Moody (Professor)

This doctoral seminar examines the theoretical roots of contemporary issues in governance and policy. It explores beyond the public management discourse to a discussion of policy governance and policy politics. Underneath current theories of the state and expressions of state power is the “disciplinary turn” based on Neoliberal theories that redefine the relationship of the individual and society. A major expression of this change is summarized in the term “The Carceral State,” which has come to mean more general changes in society than mass incarceration and zero-tolerance policing. This seminar is developed to have broad interest to doctoral students in a wide range of social sciences. There will be guest lecturers participating via Skype. The seminar will explore the growing literature on surveillance, as “smart communities,” electronic records, and “hot spot policing” extend the gaze of government and corporations deeper into our lives.
